

Pastoral letter: New beginnings



'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.' (John $1\colon 1$)

Christmas is a time of traditions for many of us. We choose to eat the same types of food, often follow the same timetable on the day itself, play the same games or watch the same films. But Christmas should also be a time to experience new beginnings.

The Christmas story has a new beginning at its heart, the birth of Jesus Christ. A tribute to Ian Wallace



It is with great sadness that we pay tribute to Ian Wallace who died peacefully on October 23rd with some of his family around him. Ian and Monica came from Reading to Streatley in 2004 not long after being retired from his post as a lecturer in the Agricultural Faculty of the University.

Ian grew up in Teddington, went to Agricultural College and gained National Diplomas in Agriculture and Farm Management. After college he was recruited by the Crown Agents to work as an Agricultural Officer in Kenya helping small scale farmers grow tea and coffee. It was here that he was touched by the prayers of some vibrant African Christians who worked under him and moved from nominal Christianity to making a personal commitment of his life to Christ.

He now began to feel that being a government officer gave him a special opportunity to be a different kind of missionary reaching people that other missionaries may not reach. Some of those he worked with were future political leaders, whilst some of those he fellowshipped with in the East African Revival Movement went on to become Bishops and Church leaders. In one appointment where he stayed for six years he became a Methodist local preacher and also mixed with Baptists and Presbyterians, but at heart he remained an Anglican.

Ian met his wife Monica through mutual friends in Nairobi and they were married in 1964. Richard, their first child was born in Uganda; Jeremy, Sarah and David were born in Kenya to which Ian returned to become principal of an agricultural training college. In 1975 the family returned to the UK and settled in Reading where Ian did an MSc course in Agricultural Extension at the University. Ian and Monica moved to Fiji in January 1977 where he became Principal of Fiji Agricultural College before returning to Reading permanently in 1979. He worked for TEAR Fund, a Christian Charity supporting and advising on agricultural and development projects all over the world which necessitated much travelling. This was followed by a lectureship in the Agricultural Faculty of Reading University in 1984.

Ian, Monica and the children became committed and active members of Greyfriars Church for many years. When Ian and Monica moved to Streatley, they joined St Mary's and Ian began training as a Lay Reader completing after the United Benefice was formed in 2007. His faithful biblical preaching coupled with a gracious and confident Christian witness was a challenge and help to many. He will be missed not only for what he said but for what he was, as is his dear wife Monica, who died in October 2009. "With Christ which is far better".

• Posada: Making room for Jesus this Christmas



Can you offer Mary and Joseph a bed for the night on their journey to Bethlehem?

Posada is an old Mexican tradition where young people dressed as Mary and Joseph travelled from house to house asking for a room for the night and telling people about the imminent arrival of Jesus in the weeks leading up to Christmas.

Modern day Posada uses nativity figures of Mary and Joseph who travel from place to place. This gives each 'host' the chance to create their own celebration in their home or work place.

All you need to do is add your name to the Journey Rota for a night that will suit you to "host" Mary and Joseph. The host for the previous night will contact you to make arrangements to bring the figures to your home at a time to suit both of you.

For the evening you "host" Mary and Joseph you can choose to do whatever you like. Why not invite friends and family to meet them and enjoy a mince pie or two whilst re-telling the Christmas story? Included in their travelling box is a journey diary so you can note what Mary and Joseph did during their stay, and a disposable camera so you can record their stay in pictures as well.

The next day you need to take Mary and Joseph to the next host on the Journey Rota, the host on Christmas Eve making arrangements for them to be brought to church on Christmas morning. It's as simple as that!

Mercy Ships (Hope on the Horizon) recently installed a CT scanner on board the African Mercy ship, providing free scans for surgery for patients in Pointe Noire in the Congo. One patient who benefited was spirited 17 year old Grace, whose facial tumour had been growing for 10 years. The new scanner provided critically needed scans to enable her surgeon to successfully remove the huge tumour. Also in the Congo the largest hospital ship, Africa Mercy, began surgeries. More than 7,300 people queued from early morning. By the end of the day 4236 men, women and children had been assessed as possible patients; 1326 received appointment cards to be seen by a surgeon for further evaluation during Africa Mercy's stay in the country. Mercy Ships really do bring Hope on the Horizon to many and in so many ways. Your continued generous support will be most welcome.

Alterations to Services at St Mary's from January 2014

Resource within the clergy team that was already stretched with the departure of the Revd Mark Blamey will, with the appointment of Revd Luci Heyn as a member of the clergy team in Hermitage from January next year and the sad death of Ian Wallace, be reduced to the point where a reduction in the number of services has become inevitable until a new vicar is appointed.

The wardens and clergy team have decided that from January until May 2014 when we trust a new incumbent will be in place, St Mary's family service will be combined with that of St Thomas'. This service will be held at St Thomas' church on the first Sunday of the month at 10.00am. On the third Sunday of each month, the family service at St Mary's will be replaced with a combined parish communion service with St. Andrew's, the location of which will alternate on a monthly basis between the two churches. These services will be held at the usual time of 10.30am.

Thus the services on Sunday 19th January and Sunday 16th March will be held in St Andrew's; the service on Sunday 16th February will be held in St Mary's. There will be a United Benefice service for Mothering Sunday on 30th March at 10.30am in St Mary's, led by our Area Dean, Revd Kevin Davies from the Langtree Team Ministry.

St Thomas' church offers excellent facilities and resources to conduct services that are truly geared to specifically meet the needs of families. Their congregation and team look forward to welcoming families from St Mary's during the period of the interregnum and to providing them with a richly rewarding and enjoyable experience each month.
