● Pastoral letter: Some thoughts on Pastoral Caring and joining the team



Pastoral care is the responsibility of all Christians and something most Christians do automatically without giving it a name. It is born out of God's love for us that we should love and care for each other. 'I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.' John 13—34-35.

Traditionally Pastoral Care has been seen as the responsibility of the clergy, the shepherd overseeing all aspects of his/her flock. We find reference to shepherds and pastors tending to the needs of their 'flocks' throughout the OT and NT, from Psalm 23 to 1 Peter ch. 5 v 2, 'I exhort the elders among you to tend the flock of God that is in your charge, exercising the oversight, not under compulsion but willingly, as God would have you do it.' In John ch. 10 Jesus describes himself as the Good Shepherd, he is our model for pastoral caring. He taught us to love and care for one another and that our love should be real and practical.

As we gently move forward, beginning to experience changes and do new things, I believe we will see positive evidence of the strengthening of our church communities and a greater ability to reach out into the community. However we do need to find ways to improving pastoral care. Three churches and only one full-time member of the Ministry Team means it's impossible to follow traditional lines. I am aware that St. Mary's has a Good Neighbours Scheme which has worked well, that the choirs have their own excellent caring network and that in St Andrew's and St Thomas' there are individuals who constantly keep an eye open for anyone in need. We already have some 'caring shepherds.'

The next step towards strengthen our Benefice both pastorally and spiritually is to begin the process of gathering together a more formal Benefice Pastoral Caring Team – perhaps "BPCT" for short! We need two or three members from each congregation who have an interest in the ministry of pastoral caring to come forward. Individuals who feel they would like to and be prepared to undergo some training and to see if it's for them. The Benefice is very fortunate that having Wendy Middleton training for Ordained Ministry, interested members of our congregations are able to join her on training sessions.

The Summer Term is fast approaching, the topic of which is Pastoral Care. I quote from the Introduction to Pastoral Care which can be found on the Diocesan website. All Christians care for others, but some develop a particular ministry in this area, formal or informal. This course is for anyone who would like to learn more about this important aspect of caring. It will look at practical skills in pastoral care, issues of good practice, and what it means to care as a Christian. The course runs over a number of Tuesday evenings from 14th April to 23rd June at Diocesan Church House in Oxford. There is no homework, unless you choose to do any and there is no essay to write at the end... unless you feel you would like to!

It is important that members of any team we hope to form undergo some formal training, partly for your own protection as well as safeguarding issues. If and when a team is set up, team members would be expected to meet regularly with me for prayer and to support each other, but we are all answerable to the vicar, Revd Paul Boughton. I will be attending the course with Wendy and we both hope that a number of you will want to join us – ladies and gentleman. By attending and supporting Wendy there should be no cost. It is an opportunity to come and meet others who have a similar interest, to listen, to learn and to see if God is calling you to support this important ministry in our United Benefice.

 I shall never forget the first time that I celebrated the whole of Easter. We began with a memorial of the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday evening; capturing something of the atmosphere of the last meal that Jesus would share with his closest friends. The meal was followed by listening to an account of Jesus going into the Garden of Gethsemane after the meal with his disciples to pray. We sensed something of the struggle of Christ as he faced the reality of facing death. And then his arrest.

On Good Friday we heard how the trial was over-ruled by popular opinion and how Jesus died. Against such a backdrop of injustice and hopelessness, celebrating The Resurrection on Easter Day is such a remarkable contrast, as Jesus leads the way into a new life that he invites us to share.


This Easter I invite you to share in the whole celebration, beginning on Maundy Thursday and sensing the wonder of The Resurrection on Easter Day. I do hope you will find this Easter a faith deepening experience as you progress in your journey of faith.
